STICKY KNOWLEDGE FOR SCIENCE

1. Materials can be changed by physical force (twisting, bending, squashing and stretching)

2. Know that materials can have useful properties for a given job (including being waterproof, strong, hard, soft, flexible, rigid, light or heavy)

3. Know that many types of plastic are waterproof.

4. Wood is used to make furniture because it is a hard and a strong material.

- 5. Metal can be used to make coins, cans, cars and cutlery.
- 6. Glass is used to make windows because it is transparent.

7. Some objects can be made from a range of different materials for example a spoon could be made from metal or plastic.

8. Some materials are not suitable due to their properties, for example paper would not make a good window.
